Course Description:

Undergraduate Catalog: Introduction to fundamental concepts and major fields of study in geography.

The course consists of an extensive examination of physical and cultural factors that contribute to and produce the variable character of the earth's surface and a discussion of the significance of geographic concepts and factors to world affairs.

Scope and Objectives:

This course is designed to introduce you to the many physical and cultural factors that contribute to and produce the variable character of the earth's surface. You will be introduced to several areas of geographic study, tools geographers use, our department's curriculum, possible career paths, and much more.

Learning Outcomes:

At the end of this course, students will:

- o be able to identify and explain key terms, facts, and fundamental concepts in geography
- o develop a broader understanding of the diversity of fields of study in geography.
- be able to connect concepts in geography with other fields of study (e.g., geology, engineering, sociology, history, business).
- be able to identify and explain the importance of geography in analyzing and developing solutions to problems at local, regional and global scales.

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Required Books:

All readings will be available on canvas under the corresponding modules.

Mandatory Course Requirements:

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- 1. Weekly Reading Quizzes: There will be a total of 11 reading quizzes. Each reading quiz will correspond to that week's topic. The quiz will be left open for one week, from the beginning of class Wednesday to the beginning of class the following Wednesday. That means that you must complete the reading and the quiz before that topic is discussed about in class. All questions will pertain to that week's reading which may be found on canvas. Each quiz is worth a total of 20 points for a total of 220 points. The quizzes will be completed on canvas. Each quiz may consist of multiply choice, true/false, matching, or fill in the blank. Each quiz will be timed for 20 minutes.
- 2. **In-Class Participation:** Every class will have a in-class activity. These activities will account for a total of 280 points. You will earn credit for these activities only if you are present in class the day we do them. Thus, coming to class is vital for your success in Introduction to Geography. If there is a university approved excuse for you missing class, an optional assignment may be given at the request of the student within 7 days from the missing of class. After 7 days from the date of the excused absence a make-up will be unavailable, regardless of when the student contacts the professor about said absence.

Late Work Policy:

You may complete weekly quizzes up to 24 hours after the turn-in deadline. However, your grade will be deducted a 10% late penalty. Thus, if you complete the quiz within this 24 hour window, and you earn a 90%, that grade will be reduced to 80% because of the 10% penalty.

Our class periods are precious and limited. It is during these short times that we have to teach you about geography and your learning will not be maximized if you are distracted by other things. Therefore, I recommend getting to know someone in the class that you can get notes from if you miss class.
